Why Bees Matter!



Did you know your backyard, local park, school grounds and even the footpath on your way to school can be a home for all sorts of wild animals? Urban, garden and backyard habitats aren't just for our pets - they're also home to birds, insects, reptiles and more!

You might spot animals like:

- Insects - bees, ants, beetles, butterflies
- Snails and slugs
- Skinks and geckos
- Birds - like tūī, pīwakawaka (fantail), swallows, blackbirds and even kea
- Hedgehogs

Among these backyard visitors, bees are some of the most important – especially New Zealand's native bees. While we have about 28 native species here, Australia has around 1,500!

That makes our bees pretty special.

What's the Buzz About Native Bees?

Our native bees might be small and often hard to spot, but they're powerful pollinators. They help plants grow by carrying pollen from flower to flower while collecting nectar and food. Unlike honey bees, native bees:

- Don't live in hives
- Don't make honey
- Nest in bare patches of undisturbed soil

How can you help?



1. Plant native trees and flowers in your garden.
2. Leave small areas of bare soil.
3. Buy seasonal, organic fruit and vegetables to help reduce pesticide use.

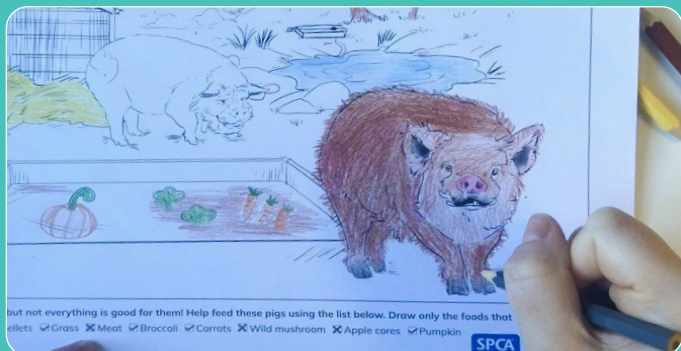
These small actions can help protect native bees and the important work they do in keeping our ecosystems healthy and blooming, including helping plants like pōhutukawa grow and thrive.

So next time you see a bee buzzing in your garden, take a moment to thank it - it's doing way more than you might think!

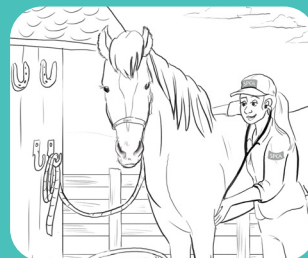
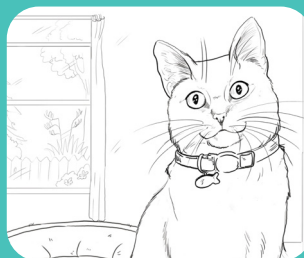
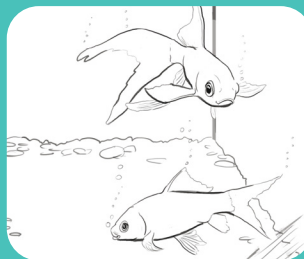
- Have short tongues, perfect for small native flowers like mānuka and kānuka

You can also find them in orchards and veggie gardens, where they help pollinate fruits and crops. But they need flowers nearby to survive as they're not big travellers!

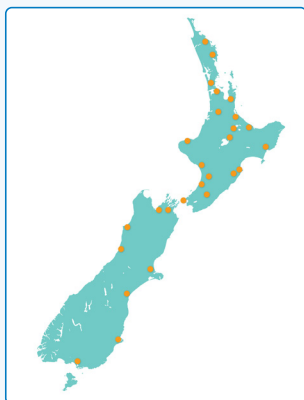


Did you know that every year, over 30,000 animals in Aotearoa get a helping hand from SPCA? From injured kittens to abandoned puppies and even lost chickens, SPCA works hard

to create a New Zealand where all animals are treated with empathy, compassion and respect.

SPCA stands for the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals - quite a mouthful!

That's why we just say SPCA. There are 27 SPCA Centres all around New Zealand, and they've been helping animals since 1872 - that's more than 150 years ago!



SPCA is a charity, which means we don't make money from what we do. Instead, we rely on kind-hearted people to donate, volunteer or fundraise so we can keep rescuing, treating and rehoming animals in need. In fact, we need around \$66 million every year to keep going! We also help by responding to over 13,000 animal welfare concerns a year - that's a lot of animal emergencies!

Did you know there are many awesome jobs at SPCA that help animals in different ways?

From Inspectors to animal care attendants, vets and vet nurses, our team works hard every day to advance animal welfare and prevent cruelty in Aotearoa.

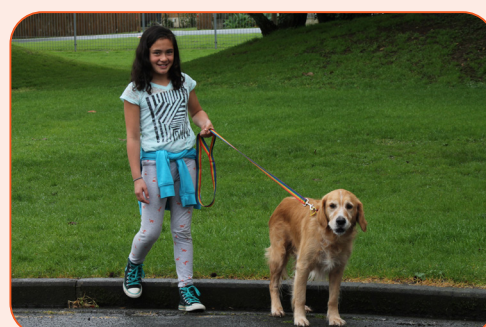
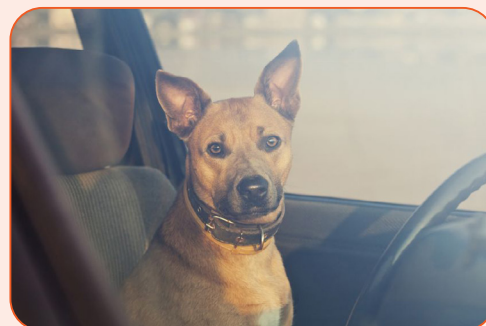

Keep Your Pets Safe This Festive Season

Christmas is a time for yummy food, sparkly decorations and fun with family - but it's also a time when pets can easily get into trouble. Some things that are safe for humans can be really dangerous for animals.



Be Careful What Your Pets Eat!

Animals don't digest food the same way we do. That means some human food can make them very sick, or may even be deadly. Check out the [full list](#) of dangerous foods that your companions should never munch on! Let's keep our furry friends safe and happy this festive season!

NEVER feed your pet:

1. **CHOCOLATE** - Can cause vomiting, seizures and heart issues. 
2. **FRUITCAKE** - Raisins and grapes are toxic. 
3. **ONIONS & CHIVES** - Can damage red blood cells. 
4. **FATTY MEATS** - Can cause painful stomach issues. 
5. **CORN COBS** - Can block their tummies. 
6. **SUGAR-FREE LOLLIES** - Xylitol is very poisonous to dogs. 
7. **AVOCADO** - Toxic to many animals. 
8. **ALCOHOL & CAFFEINE** - Never safe for pets. 

Safe & Fun Ways to Treat Your Pet

Try these ideas instead:

- Go for a post-breakfast walk
- Play games in the garden
- Freeze pet food in toys or ice cubes



Talk to an adult and call your vet right away if your pet:

- Vomits
- Stops eating
- Acts tired or wobbly
- Seems "not right"

Decorate with Pets in Mind

Your decorations might look like toys or snacks!

Safer decorating tips:

- Secure your Christmas tree so it can't fall over
- Use battery lights instead of plug-in ones
- Avoid tinsel (especially for curious cats)
- Prevent a fall - tape down or cover cords
- Skip real candles unless an adult is watching closely
- Use shatter-proof decorations (plastic, wood, paper)

No Bake Cake Pops Recipe

Ready to create some delicious cake pops? They're fun, quick and the perfect party treat for your human friends and family to enjoy!

Ingredients:

- 2/3 cup almond flour
- 1/2 cup coconut flour
- 1/4 cup maple syrup
- 3 Tbsp butter (melted)
- 1 pinch sea salt
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup white chocolate chips
- rainbow sprinkles



Method:



1 Combine almond flour, coconut flour, maple syrup, melted butter, vanilla and salt.



2 Using a spoon, divide the mixture into 12 equal sized balls.



3 Take each portion and roll it into a ball with your hands.



4 Place balls on a plate. Add sticks (if using) and chill in fridge for 30 minutes to set.



5 Melt white chocolate chips in a microwave safe bowl.



6 Remove dough balls from fridge and dip each ball in chocolate.



7 Sprinkle with rainbow sprinkles, then chill for 30 minutes to firm up.

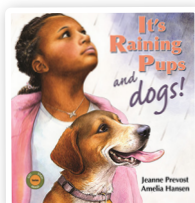


Title: It's Raining Dogs and Pups!

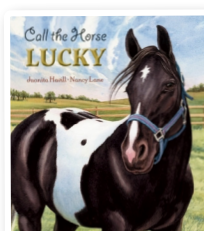


After moving to start a new life after his mum's death, Travis discovers a colony of feral cats in desperate need of help.
